GRANTMAKING 2020-2021 Recap



The Presser Foundation assisted in funding Revivals of Blackness, put together by World Cafe Live.
This multimedia performance is a ceremony interweaving music, dance, poetry, interviews, and visuals to illustrate the collective lived experiences of diasporic Blackness.



Presser supported the <u>Fetter & Air</u>, an immersive sound installation experience provided by the Mendelssohn Chorus of Philadelphia (MCP).



The Foundation supported the Chester Children's Chorus (CCC) by providing funds that were used to purchase large tents. These tents helped the CCC follow CDC guidelines by conducting their Summer Learning Program Camp outside. Camp could continue on, regardless of rain or shine!

During a difficult year, The Presser Foundation continued to give in its six focus areas - Advancement of Music, Assistance To Music Teachers, Capital Support, Graduate Music Award, Special Projects, and Undergraduate Scholar Award.

The Foundation gave Special Projects grants totaling \$517,300 to 42 nonprofits, who received the funds immediately to combat the effects of COVID-19. This group was comprised of six newer organizations, five pilot programs and 32 creative proposals, many of which requested funding for technology to conduct online broadcasts during COVID.

General operating support (support for Advancement of Music) totaling \$1,166,500 was extended to 86 music organizations in the Greater Philadelphia area. These grants included both single year and multi-year support, and were also paid out immediately in order to help these organizations reimagine their performances.

Thirty-five organizations received Capital Support grants totaling \$1,954,200. This funding will be paid over six years and provide both single year and multi-year support to various organizations. An additional \$547,500 is being paid by the Foundation due to previous commitments. These wide-ranging grants were used to help support the purchase of a computer, equipment for recording, supplies for summer camps, a micro-stage, and needed maintenance and renovation of buildings.

Undergraduate Scholar and Graduate Music Awards, ranging from \$4,000 to \$10,000 and totaling \$1,040,000, were given to 220 undergraduate schools of music and 16 graduate schools of music. These awards are designed to encourage and support in a special way the education and career of music students who exemplify high academic and musical accomplishment, leadership, and citizenship.

Finally, The Presser Foundation continues to support retired music teachers with financial need through Assistance To Music Teachers. The Foundation is open to considering nominations from institutions for potential new assistance recipients. Nominating institutions should have first-hand knowledge of the applicant's professional accomplishments and personal circumstances, either directly as current or former employers, or through professional or community contacts. In total, Presser gave nearly \$4.2 million this fiscal year in order to support 419 people and organizations in/contributing to a wide variety of musical endeavors. We are proud to work with you, and appreciate your important work and service to your community!

The Foundation is committed to the principles of diversity, equity, and inclusion, both internally and externally. The Nominating and Governance Committee worked hard this year to revise the nominating process and grant guidelines, and Presser's Racial Equity Intern (more below) also contributed to advancing this work. The Foundation will continue to find and implement concrete ways to embed these principles into its values, practices, and systems.
