Wildfire Resources For Musicians

Wildfires have devastated Los Angeles, and many musicians and performers lost residences, studios, and livelihoods. If you would like to support those affected by the fires, Grantmakers for the Arts compiled **this list of organizations and resources**.

Additionally, <u>MusiCares Foundation</u>, <u>Inc</u>., based in Santa Monica, California, created the Disaster Relief Fund as a resource for eligible music professionals impacted by natural disasters, including the fires in the greater Los Angeles area. The organization serves as a safety net supporting the health and welfare of the music community.

GRAMMY Museum and Recording Academy's Music Educator Award

The Music Educator Award was created to honor current educators (from kindergarten through college, in both public and private schools) who have made a significant and lasting impact on the field of music education and who show a dedication to the larger cause of supporting music education in schools. The Award serves as a powerful advocate for music education. Twenty-five teachers have the opportunity to win grants for themselves and their school's music program. 100th Anniversary of Theodore Presser's Passing

The Presser Foundation's founder Theodore Presser, music educator and publisher, passed away in October 1925. He filled much of his life with philanthropy, including building and supporting the Presser Home for Retired Music Teachers. Following his passing, his philanthropic legacy lived on through the establishment of The Presser Foundation.

To celebrate this milestone and a century of music philanthropy, the Foundation is collaborating with Temple University's Charles Library and its Special Collections Research Center to host an exhibit from September to December 2025. Grantees and the wider music community will be invited to a reception on November 21, 2025 at the Charles Library to commemorate this momentous occasion. Stay tuned for more information.

PARTNER SPOTLIGHT







Community Music School Collegeville

The <u>Community Music School Collegeville</u> (CMS) provides comprehensive music education through individual lessons, classes, ensembles, and performances for students of all ages, interests, and abilities. In FY24, CMS served 657 individual students through weekly music lessons and camps, with 42% identifying as BIPOC. It also provided over \$112,000 in financial assistance, scholarships, discounts, and free community programming.

Since September 2021, they've eliminated financial barriers by offering several tuition-free programs: Musikgarten classes for ages 15 months to 7 years, KinderFlute classes for ages 5-8, and Suzuki group classes for young string players. These programs foster community and mentorship among students and families, serving 234 families in FY24 alone.

Instruction primarily takes place in person, with the opportunity to take classes virtually. The school maintains a vibrant year-round schedule, including a 6-week summer session featuring individual lessons and camps. Students regularly achieve recognition in prestigious programs, with many joining the Philadelphia Sinfonia and Philadelphia Youth Orchestra and participating in PMEA Band, Choral, and Orchestra festivals.

Community engagement remains central to CMS' mission. Through partnerships with organizations like the Elmwood Park Zoo, Berks Jazz Fest, Steel River Playhouse, and various local institutions, CMS hosted over 50 free concerts and events, reaching more than 4,500 community members in FY24. These partnerships have created performance opportunities for school-age and adult students and ensembles.

Finally, the newly established Junior Board, comprised of students and alumni below 18 years of age, has been active in community outreach, leading performances at senior centers and developing peer education initiatives such as musical story hours, musical petting zoos, and educational displays about musical genres and history.





Delaware Symphony Orchestra

The **Delaware Symphony Orchestra** (DSO) delivered a vibrant and impactful 2023-24 season, performing in diverse venues across the region, including The Grand Opera House, Cape Henlopen High School, and the Hotel du Pont. The season showcased a series of captivating programs such as *Sky*, *Sea*, and *Rhapsody*, *¡Música Bravo!*, *From Home to Rome*, *Holidays at the Hotel*, and *Music of the African Diaspora*.

Education remained a cornerstone of DSO's mission, with a strong emphasis on serving Title 1 schools. Specialized concerts for elementary and middle school students included the standout production Migrations in Rhythm: Concerto for Beatbox and Rhyme. This innovative program, performed multiple times in Wilmington and Dover, seamlessly blended classical music with beatboxing and spoken word while celebrating musical traditions from African, Irish, Brazilian, and Cuban cultures. To deepen the educational experience, DSO provided educators with comprehensive lesson materials, introducing students to symphonic instruments and musical styles ahead of the performances.

Expanding its community outreach, DSO launched free concerts at Howard High School of Technology and Christina Cultural Arts Center. Beyond performances, the orchestra extended its educational efforts through masterclasses led by DSO musicians, guest conductors, and artists at Cab Calloway School of the Arts and The Music School of Delaware. Collaborations with organizations such as the Boys and Girls Clubs of Delaware, Christina Cultural Arts Center, Newark Senior Center, and the YMCA of Delaware further enriched the orchestra's outreach, offering additional programs and interactive Q&A sessions to inspire and engage the community.
